APPENDIX E - DEFINITIONS

ALOHA	<i>Aerial Location of Hazardous Atmospheres</i> - Computer program developed by the National Oceanographic Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) for modeling plumes of chemical releases.
ARC	<i>American Red Cross</i>
CAMEO	<i>Computer-Aided Management of Emergency Operations</i> - Computer program developed by the National Oceanographic Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) to assist in the management of hazardous materials incidents. Included Response Information Data Sheets (RIDS) which gives information on chemical properties, health hazards, fire hazards, first aid and proper protective equipment.
Cold Zone	Area of a hazardous materials incident where there is no threat of contamination. Area where command and support functions are established. Also known as the Green Zone.
DEM	<i>Department of Emergency Management</i>
DOE	<i>Washington State Department of Ecology</i>
DOT	<i>Washington State Department of Transportation</i>
EAS	<i>Emergency Alerting System</i> - Replaced the Emergency Broadcast System (EBS) for communicating emergency information electronically to the public via Television and Radio.
EMD	<i>Emergency Management Division</i> - State level emergency management office.
EMS	<i>Emergency Medical Service</i> - Medical First Responders, such as paramedics and emergency medical technicians.
EOC	<i>Emergency Operations Center</i> - Location established for coordination of information and establishment of policy from legislative authorities during a disaster situation. Primary EOC for Okanogan County is located at the Sheriff's Office, 123 5 th Avenue N., Okanogan, Grainger Administrative Building.
EPA	<i>United States Environmental Protection Agency</i>
Evacuation	The process of moving persons out of an area effected or potentially effected by a disaster situation.
FEMA	<i>Federal Emergency Management Agency</i>
FIRE MOB	<i>Fire Mobilization Plan</i> - Washington State plan for the mobilization of resources throughout the state for response to major incidents.
HAZMAT	<i>Hazardous Materials</i>
HAZWOPER	<i>Hazardous Waste Operations and Emergency Response</i> - Set forth in 29 CFR 1910.120.
Hot Zone	The exclusion zone. Area which is contaminated. Also known as the Red Zone
IC	<i>Incident Commander</i> - Person in charge of an incident. Usually the senior office on-scene.

ICS	<i>Incident Command System, Accepted system to manage an incident (functional management). Can expand or contract to the size of an incident.</i>
IDLH	<i>Immediately Dangerous to Life or Health</i>
LEPC	<i>Local Emergency Planning Committee, Made up of local/county law enforcement, fire, emergency management personnel, community members, chemical facility representative, Emergency Management Department and others to prepare and plan for hazardous materials emergencies. Required under SARA Title 3.</i>
NIMS	<i>National Incident Management System</i>
OC SO	<i>Okanogan County Sheriffs Office</i>
OSC	<i>On-Scene Coordinator</i>
PPE	<i>Personal Protective Equipment</i>
PUD	<i>Public Utility District</i>
RCW	<i>Revised Code of Washington</i>
RIDS	<i>Response Information Data Sheets - A section of the CAMEO program and provides information for responders on appropriate actions to take when faced with a hazardous materials incident.</i>
SAR	<i>Search and Rescue</i>
SARA	<i>Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act - Public law passed in 1986 to require community planning for hazardous material emergencies. Also allows the public to be provided access to information about chemicals in their community.</i>
Shelter in Place	<i>Have persons stay inside during an incident. Used primarily during hazardous materials incidents. Also known as "In place protection."</i>
SOP	<i>Suggested Operating Procedures</i>
UC	<i>Unified Command</i>
WAC	<i>Washington Administrative Codes</i>
Warm Zone	<i>The area between the Hot and Cold zones where decontamination functions are set-up. Also referred to as the contamination reduction zone or the Yellow Zone.</i>
WSP	<i>Washington State Patrol</i>
WSDOT	<i>Washington State Department of Transportation</i>
